TerraPass

Laural Sukup a specialist with *Wisconsin DNR's Cooperative Environmental Assistance Bureau*, sent along the notice about the presentation in Madison on February 23rd about Climate Change and the Economic Impacts that may be expected. Since I will be in Madison the following week for Superior Days, I returned an email to Laural with regrets that "my travel and carbon budgets" would not support two trips to Madison.

She wrote back with a note "Something I did to ease my mind ... " and provided a link to TerraPass

. TerraPass funds renewable energy projects. The purchase of a TerraPass enables investments in projects that result in verified reductions in greenhouse gas production. The great idea is that you counterbalance your own emissions with these reductions.

A visit to the TerraPass site provides useful insight about our personal relationships with the generation of Greenhouse Gases. My 2003 Chevrolet Astro AWD van will get 17 mpg (city mileage is irrelevant if you live in Herbster). I drive a lot, about 35,000 miles each year. The TerraPass site calculates that I will use about 2, 258 gallons of fuel and generate 44,176 pounds of carbon dioxide each year. To become "carbon neutral" I should purchase a "pass" for \$159.95. That would add just slightly over 7 cents per gallon to my automobile fuel bill.

TerraPass enables similar calculations for your carbon footprint when you fly. I don't fly much. My most recent trip was to Florida. For that round trip of 2800 miles I generated 1,200 pounds of CO2. By my arithmetic, the carbon surcharge for that flight should have been \$5.99

My home combined heating and electrical bill calculates an annual 37,000 pounds of CO2 and my TerraPass for carbon neutrality would be \$184.63.

It seems more and more apparent that if something is to be done about global warming it is going to be highly dependent on individual actions. A magical high tech wand, the Invisible Hand or "This is the Government and I'm here to help", is not going to solve the serious problem we humans have created for life in our planet. It looks as though the annual invoice for at least part of my responsibility for carbon neutrality is \$350.57.

LAWSUITS and the NATIONAL FORESTS

Multiple groups in the Ely, Minnesota area have been engaged in protection of the **Superior National Forest**(SNF), which includes the **Boundary Waters Canoe Area** (BWCA). That the economic impact of this natural resource is been enormous has been recognized since **Sigurd Olson** was academic dean at **Ely Junior College**. A long <u>article</u> in the **Ely Timberjay** newspaper provides insight into the dynamics of legal actions to protect wilderness areas. While the issues are different from the issues of lawsuits that have troubled our NW Wisconsin Counties, Economic Development organizations, and environmental groups over management practices in the **Chequamegon Nicolet National Forest**, the impact of legal actions on SNF and BWCA are well worth contemplation. An <u>editorial</u> suggests that environmental advocates should pick their battles with greater care and concentrate on bigger issues like climate change and global warming.
