# **CLEAN TECH**

An article, "U.S. Green-tech hot spots go coast to coast" in C|Net called attention again to the industrial sector more commonly known as Clean Tech. Since 2004 the Clean Tech sector has been drawing more of my attention, yet little is evident regarding Wisconsin's willingness to engage and pursue the potential business opportunities that are attached to this growth industry. Perhaps there is more behind the scene than I realize. Looking deeper may reveal initiatives that should be highighted. Our Northwestern Wisconsin, Northeastern Minnesota and Michigan UP counties have long seemed a natural location to foster Clean Tech as an economic development strategy.

Early in 2007 California passed a **Global Warming Solutions Act**, which a <u>press release</u> from Gov. **Arnold Schwarzenegger**'s office called "a comprehensive program of regulatory *and market mechanisms* to achieve real, quantifiable, cost-effective reductions of greenhouse gases." (my emphasis)

A June report from the Natural Resources Defense Council(NDRC) highlighted how California is moving forward. With start-up support from the late HP founder David Packard, the Silicon Valley Leadership Group (link) involves senior officers of over 200 Silicon Valley corporations in looking after the economic health of the region. These leaders have embraced the challenges of global warming. Together with Environmental Entrepreneurs(E2)(link), a group sponsored and supported by NDRC, the report highlights a California response to managing a more stable climate while assuring economic growth. Eric Wanless, a sustainable energy expert with the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC) and coauthor of the report said "This is the first report that shows how the pieces of the puzzle fit together in California's first-in-the-nation law to limit global warming pollution. The report can help California business leaders understand how they can take advantage of the growing market opportunities for pollution-cutting technologies."

Our Norther Tier would do well to recognize the opportunities inherent in preventing green house gas pollution, providing alternative energy solutions, and pursuing the adaptations that changes in global climate and reducing our dependence on fossil fuel will inevitably require.
