Much of my thinking was occupied with pieces of email I received from **Fred Strand**, WI DNR Wildlife Biologist, who lives nearby in **Oulu**. I usually run into Fred in connection with some civic event or another as he and I seem to have similar interests. Earlier we both attended an event that I can't at the moment remember and then, again, last night we both attended the annual training session for the **Superior Days** delegation. Unfortunately we rarely have much time to explore our mutual interests in depth. That is regrettable because I have frequently had leaps of insight suggesting that Fred has a lot of depth of thought to offer. I know for example that he has a deep interest in education but apart from a modestly extended conversation a couple of years ago about the **South Shore Schools Foundation**, for which he was a major maker and shaker, we have not returned to the education topic.

Maybe I was on Fred's mind because Thursday morning I received an email forwarded by Fred from his colleague (maybe his boss) at DNR, Wildlife Ecologist **Bill Vander Zouwen**. Bill had recently returned from the **Midwest AG Energy Network Conference**. The forwarded email was a brief recap of the conference. It was stimulating and I commented in a reply to Fred that it is unfortunate that we don't have a light-pipe between Madison and northwestern Wisconsin so we can more easily experience great events as was, apparently, this event.
