# **Harvesting Future Ideas**

Progress is often a product of coordination and cooperation as well as the focused sharing of ideas. My recent experience in Michigan's Upper Peninsula shed light on how ideas should move forward and result in a potential harvest of jobs and wealth.

Someone once said "Innovation is not a solo sport," a clever phrase just close enough to someone's truth to jar open reflective thinking. Individuals may receive recognition for invention

and innovation but it is indeed rare for great ideas to emerge *de novo* from a hermit's shack. Two giants of scientific innovation, **Isaac Newton** and **Louis Pasteur**, both recognized that they were able to see farther by standing on the shoulders of giants. Companies, Departments, Institutes or Universities that pride themselves on discovery are increasingly turning to larger communities to support the critical intellectual mass – the diverse specializations – needed to foster vibrant research and publication. "Communities of practice" is a phrase that reverberates or resonates frequently in discussions of innovation and development. These communities of practice are frequently built around a central idea or cluster. **Michigan Technological University** (MTU) is making a great step forward by focusing its hiring of faculty to address four research themes; air, energy, materials and water. MTU will be a major player in a Northern Tier stretching from Fargo and Grand Forks to Sault St. Marie and embracing the entire Lake Superior basin. The emerging phenomenon of *massively distributed collaboration* brought about by new tools of digital technology – Web 2.0 – enables huge opportunities to see farther. These tools are an opportunity to foster collaboration across the Northern Tier.

MTU President **Glenn D. Mroz** attended our **Lake Superior Binational Forum** public input session in Houghton, Michigan last Friday. TGIF readers will recall that our LSBF emphasis was on the Area of Concern at and nearby Houghton; the Torch Lake AOC and its collection of superfund sites that are a legacy of copper mining in the Keweenaw Peninsula. Dr. Mroz, a Professor of Forestry and former Dean of the College of Forest Resources and Environmental Science, focused his low-key but eloquent and energizing remarks on the efforts at the University to recognize the importance of sustainability and create a path for future innovation to support the necessary and inevitable revolution in sustainability thinking. His remarks followed closely on an August 26<sup>th</sup> press release announcing appoint of faculty to fill three new endowed chairs at MTU. The MTU Strategic Faculty Hiring Initiative draws concentric circles that will help aim the efforts and resources of the University in a positive and productive direction.

Endowed chairs at MTU will support sustainability in three areas; manufacturing, materials, and environmental management. A generous gift from the Robbins family made these endowed chairs possible. Interestingly, **Richard Robbins'** ability to make such a gift can be traced to his engineering degree from MTU. The Robbins Company pioneered tunnel-boring technology that played a huge part in the successful creation of the "chunnel" between England and France. Another endowment in communications entrepreneurship, from **William and Gloria Jackson**, follows from Mr. Jackson's MTU degree in electrical engineering and his highly successful enterprises in the cable television industry. Both of these "trees" were planted by MTU in the 1950s. Solid growth takes time. These endowments, totaling \$7 million, will certainly plant seeds for future harvests.

As visible as these endowed chairs are and will be, it is perhaps even more significant that MTU is hiring additional faculty, totaling 18 in two years, to align research interests with the research theme for each of these endowed chairs. This multi-disciplinary collaboration will enable the Upper Peninsula to plant seeds for economic growth in the UP.

Planting a tree can provide shade; a presence that renders shelter, comfort and opportunities for relaxation and reflection. The Northern Tier possesses such an abundance of trees that they are a frequent focus of discussion for proponents of economic development. Jobs and wealth have certainly flowed from our forests. Managed for sustainability our forests are a gift that

keeps on giving. Managed for producing and growing ideas, our Universities foster ideas that are essential for creating a future harvest of jobs and wealth.
