Lands and Waters

I was pleased to learn that **Ruth Oppedahl** has been appointed the *Lake Superior Basin Educator*. As Lake Superior Basin Educator, Ruth will be part of UW Extension and *Wisconsin's Basin Education Initiative*. She will work with a talented group of UWEX specialists who pursue **Aldo Leopold's** vision that *a true conservation ethic will evolve only when citizens, not just government alone, take responsibility for managing and protecting our lands and waters*.

Ruth's previous work with the **Bayfield Regional Conservancy** was exemplary. A graduate of **Carlton College** and **UW Steven Point**, Ruth brought to our region both keen intelligence and quietly intense commitment to conservation values. The BRC is a non-profit land trust "dedicated to protecting natural lands, waters, forests, farms and places of scenic, spiritual and historic value in the Bayfield Region." Ruth literally created *de novo* her job as BRC's Executive Director. Starting from a base near zero, Ruth recruited a Board and raised both visibility and

money for land conservation projects in the Bayfield Region. Protection and preservation of Bayfield orchards has been notable among a <u>long list of accomplishments</u>.

Ruth's leaving BRC will leave the organization with a challenge to find a replacement. TGIF Readers may be able to help by recommending candidates. The position description is available from the <u>BRC Web site</u>. Look for the "Latest News" button at the bottom of the home page.

Another champion of conservancy, Jane Anklam, Northwoods Land Protection Coordinator for the West Wisconsin Land Trust, contacted me recently to inquire about a role for Friends of South Shore Estuaries(FoSSE) in preparation for acquisition of an important piece of privately held land that will provide critical protection for the Bark River. The Bark has been designated as prime habitat for potential restoration of breeding of the Coaster Brook Trout. **Trout Unlimited**, and its Wild Rivers Chapter President Chuck Campbell, has been heavily involved in this project. In addition to habitat preservation for the Coaster Brook Trout, the Bark, as a tributary to Lake Superior, also supports the Bark Bay Freshwater Estuary, a natural area that was on the short list of candidates for designation as a National Estuarine Research **Reserve**. The Bark is one of a few remaining pristine streams that feed Lake Superior. Many more streams, of course, are beautiful in their own unique ways. However, for many Lake Superior tributaries, land use practices beginning with the cut over in the late 1800s, continue to impact the quality of water flowing to Lake Superior. Practice of grain-seed agriculture with annual tillage has raised the specter of siltation. As testimony to the abuse of upland in the Wisconsin Lake Superior basin, we continue to see Lake Superior with a rim of red clay silt following rain storms.

The work of conserving natural habitat in the basin uplands is critically important in protection of Lake Superior's waters. The late **Walt Bressette** said "We must always remember that water is always more precious than gold."
