Synergy

Regional strategies for economic development are beginning to emerge in most parts of Wisconsin. Unfortunately Northwest Wisconsin is late to the party. The good news is that being late means we can follow some good examples while we join the fun and excitement in progress.

Wednesday I was a participant in a regional development strategy that is six years old. The host this year was the **University of Wisconsin at River Falls**. The two day **Synergy 2008** conference, with the theme *The Dawn of an Innovative Economy*, included over 140 leaders from the region seeking a common strategy to expand economic and social opportunity as well as environmental stewardship. Wisconsin's new Secretary of Commerce **Dick Leinenkugel** opened the conference with a bold outline describing how his department will foster innovation in manufacturing, briefly explaining six steps the state will pursue supporting success of new and

existing businesses. I was there to speak on the topic of *How Energy Will Shape How We Live, Work and Play.* **Dr. Jim Benson**, President Emeritus, from **Bemidji**(MN) **State University** delivered a rousing keynote addressing the question *How Does the Global Market Affect Growth and Opportunities for Small Businesses?* **Ed Barlow**, President, **Creating the Future, Inc**. filled the assembly with great ideas on the topic *How Can We Build, Attract and Maintain the Talented Workforce of the Future?*

Each of the three presentations was followed by a facilitated session in which attendees identified key ideas that could become action steps for the region. In all, close to 75 ideas were listed. Later, a robust discussion, led by facilitators **Dr. Bruce Siebold** and **Juliet Fox**, whittled, lumped and parked the ideas until three key themes emerged.

The second day of the conference was designed to enable self-selected participant groups to focus on the three key issues and create recommendations for future action. As Wednesday progressed, I wished that I had made arrangements to stay for Thursday in order to experience the energy of those breakout sessions and witness the process of generating a consensus for action. Details of the conference agenda and a pending synopsis of the outcomes will be found at the conference web site.

Efforts are moving forward to create a regional economic development effort in Northwest Wisconsin. A title and theme *Superior Growth* is emerging. With creative enthusiasm like that Jim Benson has championed and celebrated for the Bemidji region, our efforts will yield the same commitment to regional success that was evident in River Falls on Wednesday. Benson described a community commitment for Bemidji to become the best place in the country to live. Listening to him it is hard to argue. He described great ideas moving forward in Northwest Minnesota. A bit of competition from Northwest Wisconsin could help us advance together. Copying great examples with innovative modification is a smart strategy. Benson ended his riveting talk with a quotation I have loved for years; "*They copied and copied and copied but they couldn't copy my mind, so I left them standing, sweating and swearing a year and a half behind.*"

On Thursday, November 20th, **Dr. Patrick Farrell**, Provost of the **UW-Madison**, will be in Ashland for a luncheon presentation at **Northland College**. Farrell is chief operating officer at the Madison campus and oversees academic program planning, faculty and staff development, personnel oversight, budget planning and management. He will discuss UW-Madison initiatives that may be directed to community and economic development in northwest Wisconsin, including possible ties to the UW-Madison's research and development expertise.

The **Wisconsin Innovation Network**, sponsor of Farrell's presentation, is the membership subsidiary of the **Wisconsin Technology Council**. The **WIN-Lake Superior Chapter** was established three years ago to provide regional growth opportunities for businesses. An advisory group led by **Clyde Eilo** and **Dr.Fred Tidstrom** have worked with President **Tom Still** of the Wisconsin Technology Council to expand economic opportunity in Wisconsin's part of the Lake Superior basin. My hope is that many TGIF Readers will **register to join this effort** on November 20th to create and expand excitement and synergy for our region.
